GUNIEX :

Alexander the Great conquered Anatolia (most of modern day Turkey), Syria, Phoenicia, Judea, Gaza, Egypt, Mesopotamia (where he named the city of Philippi after his father), Persia, Bactria (think: Afghanistan), and as far as India. Alexander's cultural influence over these areas was immense and Greek Hellenistic thought spread for centuries after Alexander's death in 323BC. The great philosopher Aristotle tutored Alexander and Alexander's conquest and posthumous influence spread what was always conspicuously missing in Aristotle's philosophy; the ever-evasive Logos.

THE BIG IDEA OF THE TEXT:

John the Baptist was the forerunner of the Messiah, proclaiming the Christ's arrival even from the womb. Even knowing the hostility and duplicitousness of the Pharisees, he proclaimed the greatness of Christ unflinching. We as Christians do well to emulate John the Baptist. What greater calling could there be on our lives than to point people to the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world?



BIBLICAL TEXT (CSB)

John 1:19 This was John's testimony when the Jews from Jerusalem sent priests and Levites to ask him, "Who are you?" 20 He didn't deny it but confessed, "I am not the Messiah." 21 "What then?" they asked him. "Are you Elijah?" "I am not," he said.

"Are you the Prophet?" "No," he answered.

22 "Who are you, then?" they asked. "We need to give an answer to those who sent us. What can you tell us about yourself?" 23 He said, "I am a voice of one crying out in the wilderness: Make straight the way of the Lord—just as Isaiah the prophet said." 24 Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. 25 So they asked him, "Why then do you baptize if you aren't the Messiah, or Elijah, or the Prophet?"

26 "I baptize with water," John answered them. "Someone stands among you, but you don't know him. 27 He is the one coming after me, whose sandal strap I'm not worthy to untie." 28 All this happened in Bethany across the Jordan, where John was baptizing.

APPLVING OUR LIVES TO THE TEXT TOGETHER:

 When you see John's constant deference to Jesus, making himself less and Jesus more, does it convict you? Why, or why not?



- Referring to Luke 1:17, explain why John the Baptist was not actually Elijah, but like him.
- The Baptist considered himself unworthy even to do the base duty of a slave(v.27). Does this come from self-hatred, or a properly high view of God? Explain the crucial difference.
- Peak ahead at John the Baptist's words about Jesus in John 3:30. In practical terms,

how does a modern person in a virtuesignaling culture minimize self and magnify Christ?

• Jesus is coming back. In what ways are Christians to carry on the ministry of John the Baptist (v.23)?



SO WHAT, CHURCH?

FOR PARENTS:

How to Show Your Kids Jesus in This Passage: All Scripture points to Jesus. Here is how you can take what God showed you in this text and disciple your child with it! You don't need a seminary degree and you don't need to be perfect. Just point to Jesus. He is perfect.



Recite to your kids the words of John the Baptist, "Prepare the way of the Lord." Invite preschool age children to say it with you. Make it a heavy-metal-style battle cry with your sons of

any age. Tell them that this is what we do with our lives: we point people to Jesus. There is nothing greater that we could do with our lives, or with our school relationships, or with our teammates, or with our careers than to point people to Jesus like John the Baptist did.

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
